Ideas \& Content:

- Introductory paragraph has interesting:
- hook
- general information
- thesis
- Body paragraphs include interesting:
- specific, factual details
- definitions
- examples

Organization, Clarity, and Style:

- The introduction paragraph includes a hook, general information, and a thesis statement.
- Each body paragraph has an introductory sentence.
- Each body paragraph has detail sentences organized logically.
- Each body paragraph ends with a conclusion sentence.
- Transition "key words" are used to cue the reader in understanding how ideas are related.
- The conclusion paragraph restates the thesis in a new way, summarizes the main points of the essay, and ends with something the reader will think about.


## Word Choice \& Voice:

- Specific vocabulary that relates to this topic is used.
- Vague words have been replaced with vivid, accurate terms. (for example, replace: nice, stuff, things, good/bad, happy/sad, a lot, fun, very...)

Sentence Fluency:

- Sentences begin in a variety of ways. (Use your previous notes to help with this!)
- Some sentences are long (but not run-ons!), and others are short.

Conventions:

- Spelling is correct for all words, including homophones (such as their/they're/there).
- Number words less than 100 are spelled out as words, not written as digits.
- All sentences have an appropriate end-mark.
- All sentences begin with a capital letter.
- Capital letters are used to begin all proper nouns (such as place names, names of people, or titles).
- Commas, quotation marks, and apostrophes are used appropriately.
- Paragraphs are indented.
- No extra blank lines are left between paragraphs.
